This week, one of my many monitoring tasks was the analysis of our attendance and punctuality figures. Mrs Virji and I meet half-termly to analyse attendance across the school with a particular focus on children who have an attendance rate of 90% or below. We also focus on what the government refer to as 'Persistent Absentees'. These are children who miss or arrive very late for school regularly impacting their attendance severely.

Our whole school attendance figure is currently 95.7% which is very low for a school like Sandridge. The main issue affecting this low figure is the high numbers of persistent absentees. The national PA threshold is 10% but ours is currently above this which is very poor indeed. We need to work hard to reduce our 'PA' figure quickly so our attendance figure becomes more in line with national measures.

We have, therefore, reviewed our Attendance Policy recently and have decided to reinstate the Hertfordshire Fixed Penalty System as of 1st December 2018.

This means that a penalty notice will be issued once a child had had 15 sessions (half days / 7.5 full days) of unauthorised absence. The amount payable is £60 (per parent) per child. Please note: the school does not keep the money from fixed penalties.

We hope this will support the improvements we are trying to make over this academic year and have a positive impact on the achievement of affected pupils.

ZONES of Regulation

Last week, we introduced something called 'Zones of Regulation' to children across the school. **ZONES** is a concept designed by Leah Kuypers, a licensed occupation therapist, to help children gain skills in the area of self-regulation.

Self-regulation can go by many names, such as self-control, self-management and impulse control.

The **ZONES** are designed to help the pupils recognise when they are different zones as well as learn how to use strategies to change or stay in the zone they are in.

In addition to self-regulation, children develop an increased vocabulary of emotional terms, skills in reading other people's facial expressions, perspective about how others see and react to their behaviour, insight into events that trigger their behaviour, calming and alerting strategies and problem-solving skills.

Zones are represented as colours:

BLUE: sad, unwell, tired, bored, moving slowly GREEN: happy, calm, feeling okay, focused, ready to learn YELLOW: frustrated, worried, silly/wiggly, excited, loss of some control

RED: angry, frightened, yelling, hitting, out of control

There is no such thing as a bad zone; everyone experiences all zones. However, children are taught to recognise and manage the zone they are in. The Zones of Regulation are intended to be neutral and not communicate judgement.

So, if your child talks about their feelings in terms of a colour or a zone from now on, this will hopefully help you to understand how they are describing themselves.
