Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our main aim is for all disadvantaged pupils at Sandridge School to make at least good progress across all subjects and achieve *(at least)* in line with their non-disadvantaged peers nationally.

Our current strategy seeks to achieve this by ensuring that identified pupils receive the very best quality first teaching, supported by appropriate and targeted interventions which enable them to achieve (at least) age-related expectations and make good progress.

This is supported by high quality PSHE, a wide range of pastoral provision and ensuring they are able to access a range of extra-curricular activities and music *(an important part of our school life)*.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Covid-related school closure: Although, we have had a full academic year (2021-2022) back at school since the 2020/2021 periods of school closure, our disadvantaged pupils struggled significantly during both periods and not all attended school despite places being offered to them. There was also some Covid-related absence amongst our disadvantaged group last year.
2	KS1 2022 attainment in Reading, Writing & Maths of pupils eligible for the PPG was below national outcomes for 'all pupils'.
3	KS2 2022 attainment in Reading & Writing of pupils eligible for the PPG was below national outcomes for 'all pupils'.
4	 July 2022 (school) attainment data demonstrated that: in Year 3, between 25-50% of pupils eligible for the PPG met agerelated expectations in Reading, Writing & Maths in Year 4, 50% pupils eligible for the PPG met age-related expectations in Reading in Year 5, only 12.5% of pupils eligible for the PPG met age-related expectations in Reading, Writing & Maths in all year groups for Writing, pupils eligible for the PPG did not meet national outcomes (based on 2022 measures) (with the exception of Year 1 & Year 4)

5	Emotional, social & behavioural barriers prevent some children eligible for PPG from achieving their potential.
6	Not all children eligible for PPG take up instrument tuition due to the cost.
7	Not all children eligible for the PPG participate in extra-curricular school and/or community activities and clubs due to cost.
