Curriculum information - website

Teachers, this week, have been monitoring the subjects they are responsible for and ensuring that the curriculum maps are up to date following some recent revisions. They have also developed more detailed vocabulary lists per year group per subject.

Along with the termly class letters that tell you what your child will be learning and what the topics will be; please don't forget that the curriculum section of the website contains more detailed information. Each subject 'section' contains an overview of the subject, a detailed curriculum overview for Nursery – Year 6 and a vocabulary document. Some subjects have other information too. This is a great way of seeing the progression of skills in each subject and finding out, in more detail, what your child is learning.

Bus update

This week, I have been on the bus mapping out what each floor will look like and drawing up plans for where bookshelves and seating will go. We don't want you to think that it has been parked up and forgotten about! We are in the process of designing and gathering ideas. We will then make contact with those of you who have very kindly offered your skills and services. We hope to have an 'up and running' library bus by the Autumn term.

In recent weeks in Year 6, we have practising our tennis skills. From a forehand shot where you use the racket with the palm of your hand facing outwards, a backhand shot where the back of your hand is facing outwards, to a volley when you hit the ball without it bouncing. On Monday, in tennis, we first warmed up by hitting a ball up in the air for at least 10 times in a row. Then we got into groups of three and took it in turns to be the 'net' while the other two had a rally. This helped us to hit the ball at a certain height. Finally, we split into bigger groups and played relay tennis where you each hit the ball to the other group and go to the back of the line so everyone has a turn of hitting.










Year 5


This week we completed our geography unit on settlements. We have been learning mapreading skills using Ordnance Survey maps and finding out about the symbols that are used.
We put our maths knowledge to good use when following grid references and learned to
recognise whether places on maps were either hamlets, villages, towns or cities.
We worked together to demonstrate our learning by making information posters about how to
use Ordnance Survey maps.

We learnt that we had to stand sideways on, draw a number 6 with our bowling arm and step forward with the opposite foot to build momentum and speed. Then we had to release the ball with a straight arm while stepping to follow through.














Year 3



It really helped us to see how to structure the sentences.














Year 2
